CHRISTMAS GREETINGS!

I don't know about you, but I've enjoyed a few weeks at home! Don't get me wrong -- I love our show season, seeing everyone at shows and spending the weekends with our equine friends. But the last month or so in the office has been great to get some much-needed things completed, and to roll out a few great things for Stock Horse of Texas in 2017!

First up, a new website! It's not online yet, but the folks at Big Sky Internet Design are working hard to develop a fabulous new home for us on the world wide web. The new site will have photo galleries, be easier to navigate, will adapt to phones and tablets, and have some other fun features. We hope (in time) to have online show entries as one of the new benefits! I've seen some sneak peeks, and I can hardly wait to share it with everyone. Next -- an updated Stock Horse of Texas rulebook! There are a few minor rule changes (no biggies) but the best news is the rulebook has been reorganized, complete with an index so it's easier to find things. The rulebook will be available online as a PDF early in 2017, and we will have a limited number of printed books available for members.

New reining patterns! The board voted to add a few new patterns to the rulebook and add the caveat that any pattern can be designated a "lope in" pattern. What does this mean exactly? Basically if the pattern starts in the middle of the pen, you might be instructed to lope to the middle, and then continue loping (don't stop when you get to the middle) to the beginning of your pattern. This is common in other associations and will help save some time in the reining pen.

As 2016 comes to a close, we also have a "changing of the guard" so-to-speak. Baru Spiller, who has served as president since 2014, is stepping down and William Lewis is taking her place. We will honor Baru's service at the Awards Banquet in February. Thanks, Baru, for so many HOURS, WEEKS, MONTHS, YEARS you have dedicated to our association. William is already coordinating many things with Baru, and he will do a great job as he transitions to our fearless leader! I also want to recognize our outgoing directors who have helped in so many ways with our association: Tony White, Lanham Horne, Laurie Shelton and Mozaun McKibben. We thank you for your service!

On a final note, many of you have heard about the trademark issue the association has regarding our ever-popular acronym "SHOT." Well... another group trademarked the acronym in 1977 -- long before our existence -- and we must stop using it. 


Trainer's Tip with Matlock Rice Seek help!

Matlock Rice is no stranger to the show arena. When the horseman decided to try his hand at reining and cowhorse competition, though, he realized he had a steep learning curve. Rice says the best thing he did was reach out to his fellow horsemen to ask for assistance.

"When I first started this part of my life, three and a half years ago, a guy sent me a little yellow stud that was a reining horse," Rice recalls. "The first reining I went to, I did the whole pattern and never moved my hand, just like at a cutting. I was riding my cutting saddle, wearing batwing chaps and had a Clapper 27 [bit] in [the horse's] mouth. Clint



Haverty was the first person to come up to me, and he said, 'Matlock, that was good. But you never moved your hand!' Clint gave me some pointers and suggested people that could help me. That really sent me in the right direction."

Rice says no matter your skill level, don't be afraid to ask for help at a Stock Horse of Texas show. If all a rider focuses on is their own opinion and view, it will be hard to better themselves and/or their horse.

"You are never going to get any better if you don't get some advice on how to do what you do better. When I go to a show, I watch everyone. There is always someone out there – an amateur, a professional – someone that is doing something a little different with their horse that is getting a result that I would like to achieve," he says. "Now, I am not going to try it at the show, because I don't want to confuse my horse, but I do go home and try things out."

In addition to talking to other competitors about the pattern or about horsemanship, Rice will utilize the judge's score sheet as a means to educate himself. While each judge is different at the shows, and Rice knows that they are judging just that one ride, he can compare that score to previous show's scores to see if a maneuver is consistently in need of improvement.

"I like to know [what judge] likes how I ride or show, who likes my style, and adjust accordingly as a showman," he says. "As a showman, you have to be able to adjust your style to fit what that judge wants. Use your score sheet as another way to improve and receive help. And it you can't read it, ask someone that can show you how."

The goal of Stock Horse of Texas is to ride a better horse, but often, the first step is to become a better rider or showman. Rice says that a rider that is open to improvement will be a better pilot for their horse—take a chance and ask for help the next time you have a question.

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Stock Horse of Texas Family:

As I write my last letter as Stock Horse of Texas president, I reflect on a wonderful year for our association. 2016 marks the 20th year for Stock Horse of Texas helping people ride a better horse. It also marked some pivotal events. In January, Kim Lindsey, who had been in some capacity of leadership from the beginnings of the association, was hired by AQHA as their new Ranching Director. Hers were big boots to fill just

before our first and traditionally the largest show of the year, Abilene. We rolled out a new division (Intermediate) and AQHA Versatility to the show for the first time and were busting out a brand new show program!

Jill Dunkel stepped into those boots and, not worrying a whit about the fit, hit the ground running! The Abilene show broke all historical entry records, the show program is getting fine-tuned, and Kim is still promoting the ranch and stock horse industry at the world's largest breed association. As a part of her new position, Kim handed out trophies to the AQHA Versatility Ranch World



Champions in Houston – of which, four of the five happened to be Stock Horse of Texas members!

Summer shows are usually smaller, but Hamilton in August was a barn burner, and again it broke the entry record! SHOT's first official show secretary, Norma Belcher worked the show. She loved working the check-in table and helping everyone. She was often the first person a new member encountered. She literally was the face of SHOT. She saw the best in everyone and believed in the Golden Rule. She treated everyone equally, folding them into the SHOT family. At 75, her energy defied logic. MaryAnne Truemper, her co-secretary since 2000, said 'when Norma quits, I quit.' But Norma had no quit (and thankfully, neither does MaryAnne.) Within a week of the Hamilton show, Norma was seated at the check-in table by the Pearly Gates, with a smile and a good word of encouragement, making sure each arrival had a completed entry form so they could pass unfettered through the Gates.

In September, our elections were tallied and Kris Wilson was elected for another 3-yr term, continuing his service despite Stage IV kidney cancer. As a past president and long-time board member, Kris was invaluable on the board for his wisdom and experience. The national collegiate ranch horse team program owes its existence to Kris' big picture vision. He was diagnosed in 2013, and in 2015 he won the saddle for Top Hand at the Ft Worth Stock Show ranch rodeo. Talk about 'no quit!' Throughout his struggle, he managed two Silver Spur ranches in New Mexico, including the historic Bell Ranch, and remained active in meetings and decision-making in SHOT. Kris rode to Higher Ground in September.


