Judge's Corner: The Key to Cow Control

When Morgan Lybbert judged the boxing and working cow horse classes at the Western Horseman Stock Horse of Texas World Championship Show last year, he saw one recurring issue in all levels of competition. To Lybbert, many of the riders failed to show complete control of the cow.

In order to understand what a judge, like Lybbert, is looking for in the boxing and working cow class, he says to read the National Reined Cow Horse Association rulebook. On page 25 of the 2018 NRCHA Rule Book, renowned reined cow horse competitor and judge,



Bobby Ingersol states: "The most important point when working a cow is for the horse to have the advantage or be in control of the cow. At the same time, the horse should exhibit a smooth willingness to do his job. He should respond to a light rein and show good manners in his face and body."

A judge wants to see the horse work the cow in accordance with the requirements of that cow work class. Judges do not want to see a horse that is disrespectful to the rider through its head or through a negative reaction.

The AQHA, NRCHA and SHTX judge from Valley View, Texas, says, "Study and analyze the first part of the statement about controlling the cow, and study run content and how it is scored. There are five boxes on a judge's card that can be used to increase or decrease your score."

The five boxes on an NRCHA card that are also relevant to SHTX are:

1. **Position and Control:** This is the most important one. You have to be in the right position to control.
2. **Degree of Difficulty:** You need to create the degree of difficulty on the cow only if you have control.
3. **Eye Appeal:** How does your degree of difficulty and control look to the judge?
4. **Courage:** If you keep the degree of difficulty on a hard cow, you're doing it for some time with pressure. The odds go up the cow will win the longer you work. Keeping that cow shows a lot of courage.
5. **Time Worked:** If you just sit there with your cow and are not trying to drive it, that isn't showing control. Sometimes a cow doesn't want to do much, so you don't do much and sit in the middle

but that doesn't earn credit. You want to drive that cow to the left and the right. Go around and drive again, get some movement. Use your time to the best of your advantage.

It can be difficult to mark a plus in all of the judge's score boxes. Where some riders think action and speed can make up for finesse, Lybbert cautions against taking that approach to cow work.

"Just because you're doing wrong fast, doesn't make it right," he says. "Be sure your horse stops in position and turns. Just like a cutter, it has to stop and then turn. Catch back up to the cow and stop the cow, not just stop after the cow."

Cow control comes down to proper position. Lybbert advises riders to not immediately pressure the cow, but to stay back and note what the cow's reaction is to being in the arena.

"If you're not sure of how the cow will react, step to it gradually and try to keep it from getting out of the middle area," he says. "Try to keep the cow in the middle half. You don't have the advantage when you're running and following the cow from side-to-side. You're not gaining any credit or increasing your run content there because you really don't have control of that cow."

"Cow happens fast, I understand. You get all kinds of cows; horses and riders are learning. Just try to keep out of the penalty box and don't lose your cow. Do not trail your cows. If a cow stops 10 feet from the side fence and you haven't turned him, you should stop 10 feet from the fence."

First, understand how the cow class is judged. Then, ride to your advantage on the score card. The key is to control the cow, manage your time and complete the requirements of the class.

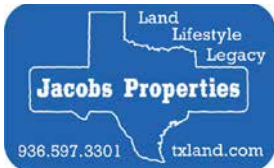

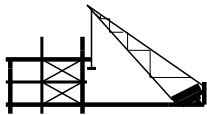

Year End Awards Eligibility

Every year, the board works to provide top-notch Year End prizes. We hope these prizes are one of the driving forces for you to return to a Stock Horse of Texas show! Over \$30,000 in prizes will be presented at the year end banquet, including custom made saddles, custom hats, buckles, tack, jackets and more. Don't get left out -- make sure you are eligible for Year End prizes!

- compete in at least 50% of the SHTX shows in a calendar year in a particular division
- for All Around awards, attendance must be in the All Around (entered in all 4 SHTX classes at 50% of the shows). For class awards, attendance is for that specific class.
- points are tracked for each division; points or attendance does not cross over per division
- points are tracked on a horse/rider combination (except for the Open division, where points are tracked on the horse)
- each year, your 2 lowest point shows are dropped. In 2018, we have 10 shows, so you must attend at least 5 shows and we will count your best 8 shows toward the all around awards

NRSHA National Championship & VRH World Show TIPS!

We are getting excited about the first National Ranch and Stock Horse Alliance (NRSHA) National Championship Show. Many of our members are showing at the NRSHA and/or AQHA Versatility World Show in Guthrie in June.

If this is your first time at a major world or national show, here are a few tips to make your show a successful and enjoyable experience.

One of the best tips – Read the Qualifying Handbook available at aqha.com/vrhworld. The handbook has specific rules and info that are important for all exhibitors!

Before the Show:

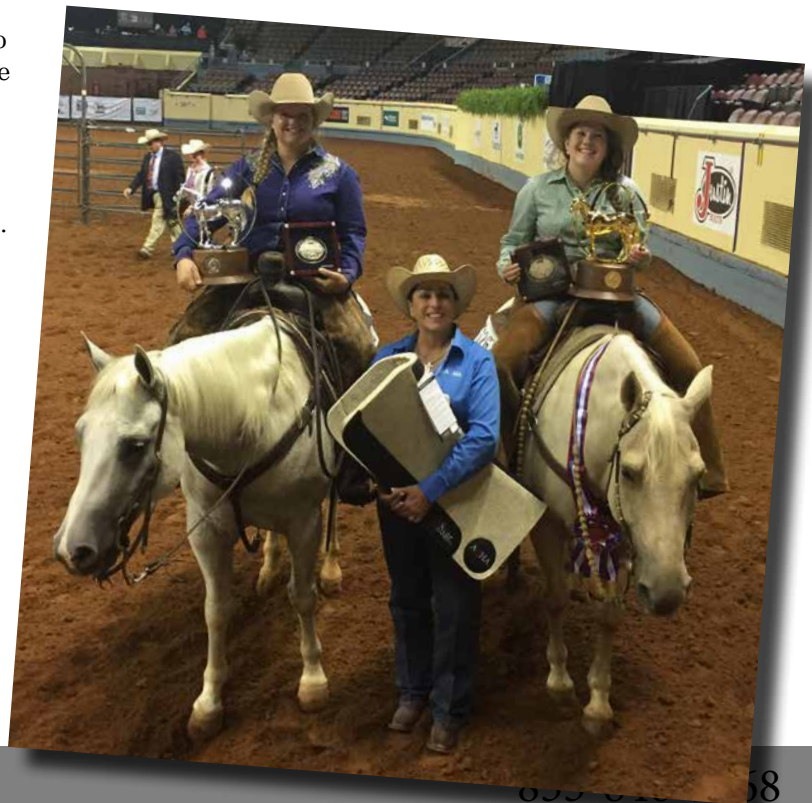
- Health & Coggins Papers – you must have a **30-day current Health Certificate** and current (12 month) Coggins papers
- Make a list of what you need so you don't forget while packing
- **Subscribe to text alerts! Text "SUBSCRIBE" to 806-576-0913. AQHA will text schedule updates throughout the week, so keep your phone handy!**
- If you're in AQHA classes, Read the therapeutic medication rules & be aware of them! Items like bute, Equioxx, dexamethasone, and many others are regulated
- Print out practice schedule and decide the best time to ride. Arenas may not always be "open riding" so please follow the practice schedule
- Highlight your classes on the show schedule available at aqha.com/vrhworld
- Patterns and working orders will be available at aqha.com/vrhworld very soon!

When you check in the Show Office:

- Get a schedule at the show with estimated times — but know it's a rolling schedule & times can change!
****Classes will NOT wait for a start time if the arena is running ahead of schedule**
- Be prepared to show your current membership card (If showing NRSHA, you must show proof of current membership for the alliance you qualified under ie. your SHTX membership)
- Pick up copies of the patterns. They will be available in a file box in the office

At the Show:

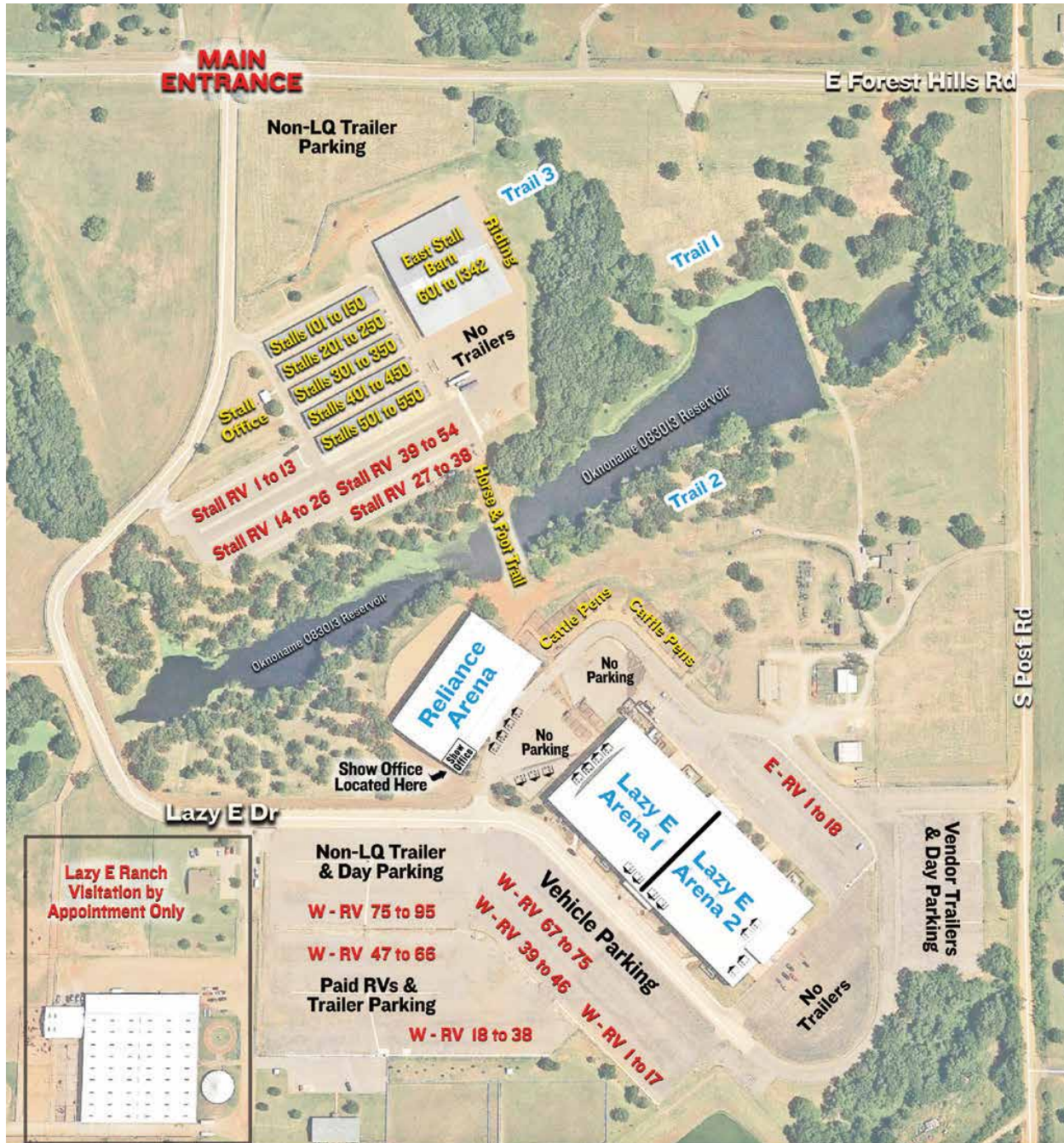
- Attend Exhibitor meetings — Show management will announce the most relevant information and any changes, etc.
- Review warm up arena etiquette!! Be courteous to others; there will be a lot of riders!
- It will be hot! Keep yourself and your horse hydrated!
- Be aware of where they are at in your next arena so you are not caught off guard and you are ready
- Pretend this show is like any other show. Keep your same routines, don't drastically change anything just because it's a world or national championship show
- You won't need a muck bucket/wheelbarrow to clean out your stall. Rolling trash bins are provided. (but bring your own apple picker)
- Make friends from other states! Have fun!
- Visit the trade show
- Put contact info on your stall in case of emergency
- Bring lots of fly spray & sunscreen
- If you want to save money at the concession stand, pack a cooler
- A professional photographer will be on the grounds. Review AQHA's photography policy in the qualifier handbook. NO professional equipment is allowed.

What Makes a Legend?

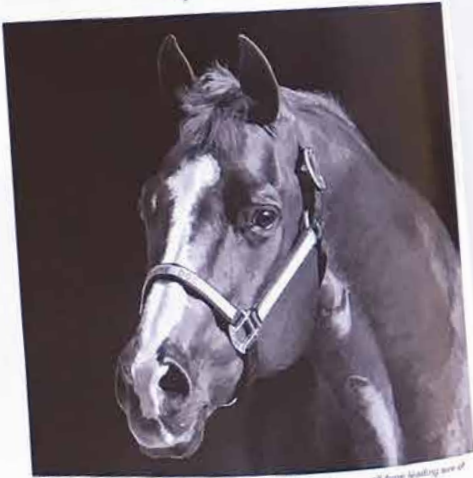
Legends Volume 9!

9 PLAYGUN

His pedigree made him destined to be a cutting horse, but this gray stallion had a wide-reaching influence on the performance-horse industry.

The Pipers believed that Playgun's conformation was ideal for an equine athlete. Such a form simply functioned well, plus the horse displayed not only cow sense, but also a people-pleasing personality.

Her earnings topped \$500,000, and she had produced just four foals prior to Playgun. The first two—the only offspring old Playgun to have been shown—were money winners. Freckles Playboy's first foal crop had arrived in 1976, and he had established himself as a sire, with 37 of his get having placed in the \$100,000 mark in cutting earnings by 1993. Playgun easily could have been expected to be one of the sale's highlights.

But the sale's success, combined with his lack of fitting in comparison with many of the other sale horses, worked in the Pipers' favor. And a number of people thought Playgun wouldn't sell if he didn't bring a hefty bid. Those factors, combined with a client of the Pipers who was willing to help out, led to a once-in-a-lifetime purchase that changed not only the course of their lives, but also cutting-horse history.

Silver and Cutting Gold

When Miss Silver Pistol was foaled, Art Shahan and his son, Wes, knew they might have their hands full. Her dam, the King's Pistol daughter Pats Lady J Be, had a reputation for being flighty. Her 1982 sire, noted by cutting-horse phenomenon Doc's History, proved the Shahans' instincts were correct. From the start, the filly was much like her dam. But the very traits that made Miss Silver Pistol a bit difficult also contributed to her success in the cutting pen. Quick, smart and sensitive, she proved to be one of the most talked-about cutting horses of her time. Her ability to hold tough cuts and her ability to make her head and neck to trap a competitor were dynamic. Wes rode her in the 1985 NCHA Futurity non-pro championship, and she eventually earned more than \$12,000. Among her other accomplishments were the 1986 NCHA Breeders Cutting Open champion.

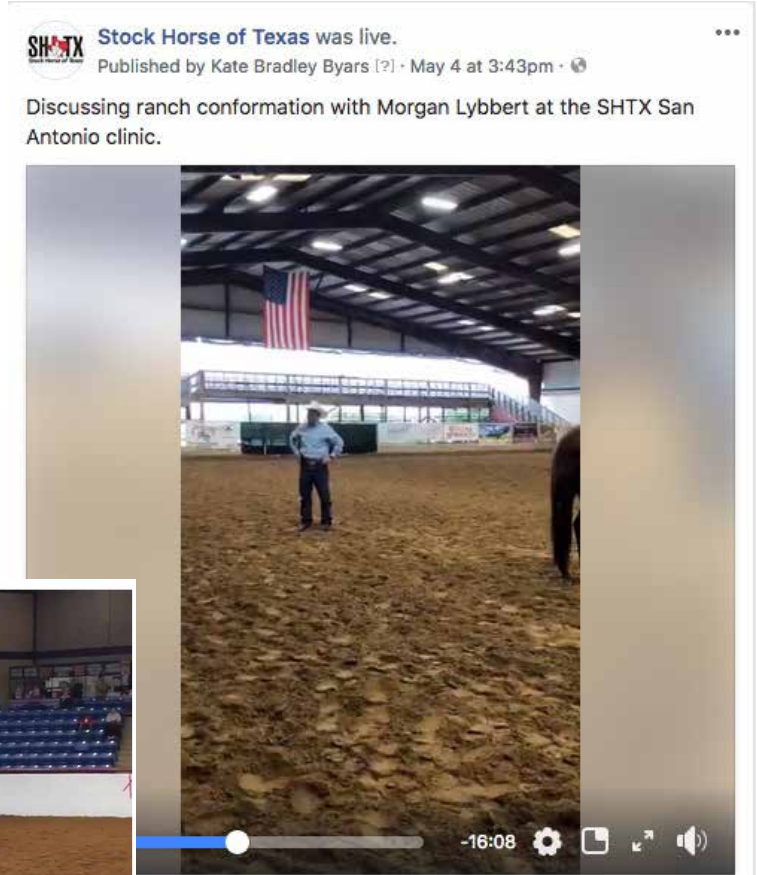

HISTORICAL CORNER

A retrospective look at a fellow competitor, friend and champion of the ranch and stock horse industry

In addition to serving as the title sponsor for the SHTX World Show, Western Horseman magazine has on many occasions featured articles about various SHTX members and other matters concerning SHTX. I think going back to some of the not-so-recent articles might be of interest to newer members particularly.

Kim Lindsey served as the first secretary of SHTX and later as Vice-President, President, board member and Executive Director. She is currently Director of Ranching for AQHA. The following article is reprinted with permission of Western Horseman.

LIFELONG HORSEWOMAN KIM LINDSEY has served on the board of directors for several associations, including the Ranch Cutting Horse Association and Stock Horse of Texas. But she's also one of the toughest riders in these and other groups that promote ranch horses through competition.

Her strong desire to compete could very well be traced to an uncooperative Shetland pony that was eventually deemed too dangerous to serve as Kim's first horse. But until the day that pony was replaced by her father's aging black mare, Kim repeated a vicious cycle of getting bucked off and climbing right back on.

at what I love, and it doesn't get much better than that.

I'VE ALWAYS LIKED COMPETITION, but I look at it more as a competition with myself. I feel like God has given me some abilities, and I need to put them to use.

WHEN SHOT FIRST STARTED, I had to do all the secretary work. So I'd show my horse, jump off and go put figures into the computer. Now, we actually have paid secretaries—including my mom—to do all of that.

MY ORIGINAL MAJOR in college was fashion merchandising. It seems strange, since I'd lived on a ranch all my life, but I always

feedlot and I worked in the office. I shouldn't tell this—since I was the one managing the books at the feedlot—but I was always confused by credits and debits in accounting class. My mom was a schoolteacher for 26 years, and I'd always have to call her to explain about debits and credits again. It's even scarier because I worked in a bank in Dimmitt, as well. But I finally got it all figured out. —

WE GENERALLY BUY rejected reining horses that just aren't going to make it at the big futurities. It's great because we've been able to purchase some great horses that just needed a new lifestyle or a few more years to mature both mentally and physically. We've got an own son of Smart Little Lena and a grandson of Doc O Lena on the ranch right now.

MY HORSESHOER TOLD ME that he doesn't know when I have time to work, with all the competitions I go to.

EARLIER THIS YEAR, I'd won a ranch cutting at Haskell and I had the trophy saddle thrown up over my regular saddle on old Freckles [pictured with Lindsey at right]. I was walking back to the trailer when Bob Moorhouse said jokingly, "Shouldn't you be home sewing on buttons or something?" I told him I'd done that before I left the house that morning. 🐾

"I'm a typical mom and ranch wife. I'm up before everyone else and usually the last one to bed at night."

MY MOTHER ALWAYS CALLED ME hardheaded, but I prefer the term "strong-willed." I guess when I was a kid I was hardheaded, but as an adult I'm just strong-willed.

I GREW UP ON A RANCH IN NEW MEXICO and have been around this lifestyle all my life. It never even crossed my mind that I would do something else. As I've gotten older, I've come to realize that the best thing in life is getting to live out my dreams. I get to work
