Judge's Corner: Making the Cut

Before AQHA offered Versatility Cutting, many stock horse competitors weren't involved in the event. But cutting has a long history that goes hand-in-hand with ranch horse events. While the event isn't run like a National Cutting Horse Association show, there are aspects of herd etiquette that transfer to the SHTX arena.

As more and more competitors enter the versatility, tips and advice for handling the cutting pen helps riders, judges and show managers. Open riders Matlock Rice and Justin Stanton stepped in to offer their take on working the herd.



First, know your draw. Whether asking for herd help or asking for help watching cattle, when you go in the class is important. The open riders at SHTX shows often stay to assist in the youth and amateur divisions, but it is not a given that they will be in a certain spot to assist you.

"One thing that makes me proud to be apart of the versatility events that are growing is that the open guys know they are there to help and help someone. If you're new to the association, or you're looking for help, my advice would be to watch and figure out who is helping and introduce yourself," says Justin Stanton. "Let us know its one of your first shows and ask if we are willing to help. All these guys are willing to help, you just need to ask us."

In the cutting, draw is important to determine how closely you, or your herd help, need to watch the number of runs in front of you. The ideal cow to cut is one that hasn't already been run out of the herd. Ask your herd help to assist in settling the herd if you're the first or second draw in the set, or group of cattle.

"There are advantages to being early in the draw. You don't have to watch the herd as close because you have more fresh cattle to cut," says Matlock Rice. "Sometimes, deeper down the draw the cattle will get wilder. Also, you have a higher chance of working a cow that's been worked before when you're later in the draw."

Pay attention to the cows and to where in the draw you fall to formulate a plan of action.

Next, go into the herd with confidence. That doesn't mean rush. While many open riders will focus on a particular cow, Stanton says that is not always ideal for a novice rider. Don't get too "in the zone" and miss out on a cow that is better positioned for the cut.

"The novice riders will think they want, say the black baldy with poop on her butt, because they hear others talking about her," Stanton

says. "If you get them pushed out and that black baldy all of a sudden sticks her tail up and runs around, don't be so zoned in to her that you don't see another cow that is volunteering. You don't want to leave one standing on top and instead scattered the rest. Don't get too zoned in on one cow."

Rice says that instead of focusing on one cow, try to select a cow that is walking away from you at a slow pace, and moving to the top of the herd. He says to drive from the cow's butt and stop it by riding to the eye. Cut for shape, not specifics.

"If a cow is walking away, keep walking behind it. If the cow moves left or right, you want to move left or right also but no so fast that you scare it. When the cow is out of the herd or turns toward you, that is when you stop it by watching the eye. Then, its time to cut," Rice says. "A lot of times people get their cow and put their hand down when they are almost still in the herd. Until your cow is clear of the herd and the remaining cows are clear of your horse's hips, that is when you should legally put your hand down."

Ideally, a two-minute cutting run results in two clean cuts on cattle. Remember, only two cattle can be cut in versatility. At the SHTX show in Boerne, some riders that lost a cow returned to the herd to cut a third, which is not allowed.

Finally, thank your help. Stanton says that new members or lower level riders shouldn't be intimidated by open riders. Rice agrees that making one acquaintance can lead to the four herd helpers you need to compete.

"Find someone there that you know of and go ask them," Rice says. "At a SHTX event, everyone is there to help you. Don't be intimidated by a trainer. We want to help you accomplish what you want to accomplish. Don't be bashful. And when its over, a simple thank you or a cold bottle of water on a hot day is enough."



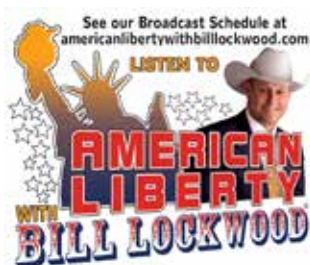

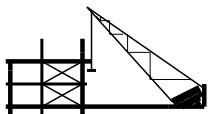

Year End Awards Eligibility

Every year, the board works to provide top-notch Year End prizes. We hope these prizes are one of the driving forces for you to return to a Stock Horse of Texas show! Over \$30,000 in prizes will be presented at the year end banquet, including custom made saddles, custom hats, buckles, tack, jackets and more. Don't get left out -- make sure you are eligible for Year End prizes!

- compete in at least 50% of the SHTX shows in a calendar year in a particular division
- for All Around awards, attendance must be in the All Around (entered in all 4 SHTX classes at 50% of the shows). For class awards, attendance is for that specific class.
- points are tracked for each division; points or attendance does not cross over per division
- points are tracked on a horse/rider combination (except for the Open division, where points are tracked on the horse)
- each year, your 2 lowest point shows are dropped. In 2018, we have 10 shows, so you must attend at least 5 shows and we will count your best 8 shows toward the all around awards

WORLD SHOW STALL POLICY

The Expo Center has hundreds of brand new stalls and RV sites! The stalls are located in the New Livestock Barn and also in the CODA (Covered Outdoor Arena). More than 100 new RVs surround these two barns. Stalls and RVs will be chosen on a first-come, first serve basis.

You must pay for the stalls and RVs when you arrive. **IF YOU ARE SAVING STALLS/RVS FOR SOMEONE, YOU MUST PAY FOR THEM AT THAT TIME.** We can't track "saved" stalls, so no stalls/RVs will be unlocked or saved unless paid for.

Please bring a separate check for stalls/RVs. They will be paid for separately from show check-in.

The stall office will be open in the new Livestock Barn on Wednesday afternoon until 7pm, and Thursday 9am-7pm. If you plan to arrive after 7pm, please call 855-846-7468 to make arrangements. After 7pm, someone from the Expo Center will unlock your stalls. Bring your receipt to check-in and pay for stalls/RVs the following morning.

PAID PRACTICES

Paid practices will be handled differently than in years' past. **ALL cow paid practices MUST BE RESERVED IN ADVANCE ON THE ENTRY FORM.** These will be added to your show bill and paid for when you check in. No additional paid cow practices will be available at check-in.

• There will be an opportunity to sign up for specific cattle times via an online sign up sheet. A link to this will be available at stockhorsetexas.org. You must reserve a cow on the entry form -- signing up for a time does NOT automatically reserve you a cow.

Trail & Reining paid practices will be **PAID IN CASH ONLY AT THE GATE.** No credit cards accepted. Sign ups are first come, first served at the gate.

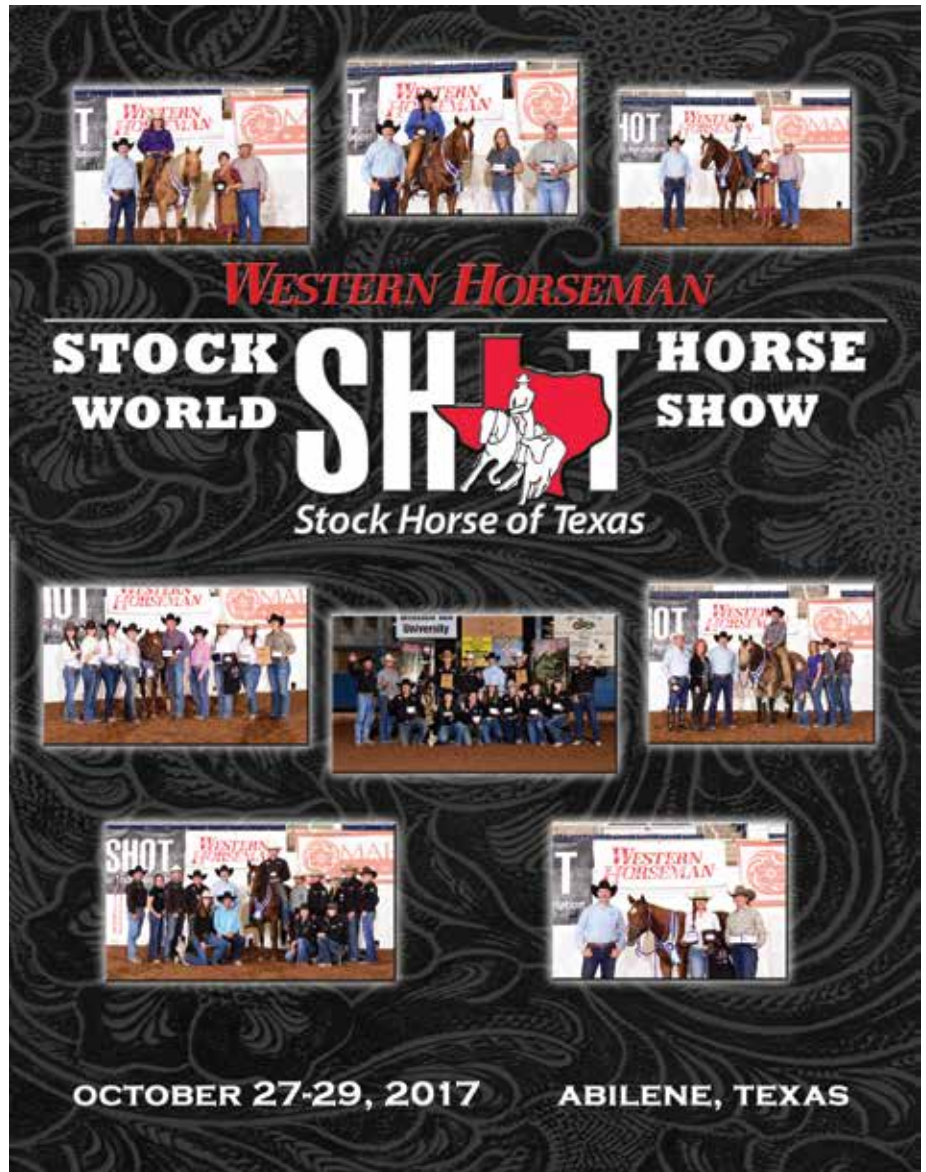

NRSHA Announces Qualifying Requirements for the 2019 NRSHA National Championships!

To be eligible to compete in the 2019 NRSHA National Championship Show, a rider must show in at least three events hosted by an alliance partner between March 1, 2018, and February 28, 2019. Riders can show with the same alliance partner three times, or any combination of alliance partners three times. However, if a rider shows with a variety of partners, it will be up to the exhibitor to get a form signed that documents his/her attendance with each partner. (This includes a combination of AQHA VRH & SHTX shows).

The rider must submit the form to an alliance partner in order to receive an invitation to the 2019 NRSHA National Show. The form is available on the NRSHA website, www.ranchhorse.net. If a rider is showing in AQHA Versatility Ranch Horse competition, they must attend a VRH All-Around show for the event to count toward qualification. AQHA shows offering individual VRH classes but not VRH All-Around classes are not considered qualifying shows.

Qualification is based on the horse/rider combination in all divisions except Open, where the qualification is based on the horse only. More information about NRSHA can be found at www.ranchhorse.net.

The Western Horseman Stock Horse World Show counts as 2 qualifying shows for NRSHA if you enter both Friday and Saturday

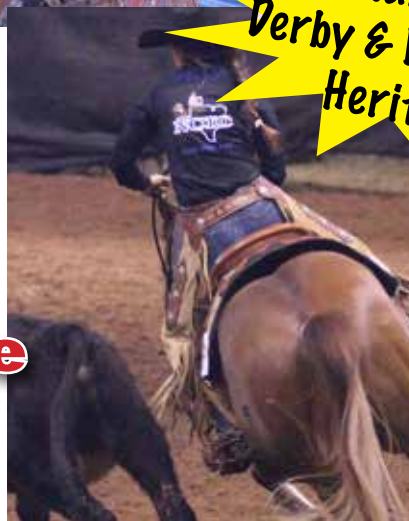

HISTORICAL CORNER WITH JIM TRUEMPER

Since the first SHTX show of 2018 was held in Bryan/College Station, I thought the time was right to revisit another year when the first show was held in the same area. The date of the show and clinic was January 4 and 5, 2002. This was long before the Brazos County Expo Center. Nestled in a grove of trees and almost hidden from view is the N.W. 'Dick' Freeman Arena of Texas A&M University. Most of you have driven by this venue and probably did not notice it directly across FM 2818 from the new Thomas G. Hildebrand Equine Complex. The Freeman Arena was also the site of our second competition in August 1998.

Saturday, January 5 was a cold and rainy day so all four classes needed to be held under roof. Even though this was the first show of 2002, it was the last show of the competition year 2001. At that time the competition year did not coincide with the calendar year. Mary Beth Sigler, daughter of Dennis Sigler, won the Open All Around with B.F. Yeates taking reserve. Dr. Dickson Varner was the Novice champion and John Chevrette won reserve. There were only two divisions at that time.

The remainder of this article is kind of a 'Where are they now?' Sassy Stanton was fourth in Novice Trail and is still a familiar face at SHTX shows. If you think you might have seen Rodney Rosenauer recently, he was competing at Athens. In the other photo, Mike Turner is now the manager of the Blue Ranch in Dumas, Texas, and was the subject, along with a whole bunch of cows, in a two page picture in the Spring 2018 issue of the Ranch Horse Journal. In that same magazine, Kim Lindsey wrote her column 'Back at the Ranch,' but at Freeman

Arena she was third and fourth in the Open All Around on two different horses. Kim is returning to Texas Tech as director of the equestrian center, while still consulting for AQHA. Dr. Dickson 'Aggie Dick' Varner remains in the reproductive department at the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M. B.F. Yeates resides in Bryan. As I sit here typing this article, I still have Gin Four Eddie, the horse I was riding that day. I will see you from the announcer's box at the next show.

9 PLAYGUN

His pedigree made him destined to be a cutting horse, but this gray stallion had a wide-reaching influence on the performance-horse industry.

IT WAS DECEMBER OF 1993, and Bruce Pappas was making the rounds gene to a sale during the National Cutting Horse Association Futurity in Fort Worth, Texas. The gray colt was a new arrival, a little bunched and awkward. When Pappas opened the stall

Legend: Her mating topped STRENGTH, and she had produced just two foals prior to Playgun. The first time, she only offspring through the years, she was very young, around 1978, and he had established himself as a sire, with 37 of his offspring placed in the \$100,000 mark in cutting earnings by 1993. Playgun easily could have been expected to be one of the sale's highlights. But the only youngster, combined with the lack of being in company with some of the other sale horses worked in the Futurity. And a number of people thought Playgun wouldn't sell if he didn't bring a better bid. From factors, combined with a desire of the Pappas who was willing to help out, led to a purchase of a horse you know that changed not only the course of their lives, but also among horse buyers.

Silver and Cutting Gold

When Max John Tavel was born, his father and his son, Max, knew they might have their hands full. His son, the King's Pook daughter, Faded Lady 2, had a reputation for being flighty. Her 1962 filly had a cutting horse temperament. One a Pook, named the Blahow (1965) was very correct. From the very start, she was very correct. Tavel's 3rd filly, also purchased by her father, was the cutting gem. Quick, calm and accurate, she proved to be one of the most talked about cutting horses of her time. Her ability to hold tough cuts and her ability to bring so low she really worked on her back making her head and neck to form a very dynamic. This role has on the NCHA Futurity, reining championships, and she eventually earned more than \$112,000. Along her other accomplishments were the 1986 NCHA Modified Cutting team champion.
